

Minneapolis Community and Technical College and Metropolitan State University Cooperative Agreement Regarding Business Programs/Associate of Science

This agreement has been entered into by Minneapolis Community and Technical College and Metropolitan State University for the benefit of students and prospective students at the two institutions. The purpose of the agreement is to insure programs of high academic quality, to encourage student achievement, and to facilitate the transfer of course credits and a smooth transition from one related degree program to the other.

Joint Admission

Students may be jointly admitted to both institutions. With joint admissions, students are guaranteed a place in Metropolitan State University's Business Administration program upon transfer from Minneapolis Community and Technical College. Joint admissions also provide that students:

1. can apply appropriate lower division credits, including those awarded through Competence Based Education, with a grade of "C" or above (or the equivalent), toward Metropolitan State University degree requirements;
2. will have access to program advisors at both institutions;
3. will have any other rights and privileges of students at both institutions and will be sent mailings from both institutions.

Program Articulation

1. Business courses offered at Minneapolis Community and Technical College and their relationship to Metro State requirements are listed in Attachment A.
2. Students who complete the Minnesota Transfer Curriculum from Minneapolis Community and Technical College will have met all lower division general education requirements at Metropolitan State University. Only the upper division liberal studies (8 credits) remain to be taken.
3. For students who have not completed the Minnesota Transfer Curriculum, community college courses will be accepted toward meeting Metropolitan State University general education requirements consistent with written equivalency guides.

Duration of Agreement

This agreement becomes effective upon the date it is signed and remains in effect until terminated by either party. It may be terminated or amended for succeeding academic years by either institution on or before June 30 of each year.

Persons Responsible/Evaluation






